NATIONAL LUTHERAN COMMUNITIES & SERVICES

In 2016, National Lutheran Communities & Services (NLCS) lived out its mission—serving seniors—in a variety of ways. There were many grace-filled moments as we continued our 126-year legacy of meeting the needs of seniors.

The NLCS Community Impact program continued to grow, awarding 21 grants totaling \$221,250. The 2016 grantees represented a broad range of organizations, addressing a variety of needs facing seniors, throughout Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, and Washington, D.C.

NLCS continued to offset the cost of care for residents and guests that were unable to pay for health care's rising costs, ensuring that they remain a part of the National Lutheran family. In 2016, more than \$8.2 million of charitable and unreimbursed care was provided to residents and guests of the National Lutheran communities.

September brought the first year of the NLCS Day of Service. Twenty-one team members from the NLCS office volunteered and together dedicated a total of 110 hours of service at The Village of Rockville—A National Lutheran Community and The Village at Orchard Ridge—A National Lutheran Community. Coordinating with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's (ELCA) initiative, *God's Work. Our Hands.*, NLCS donned golden t-shirts, engaged with residents and gained an appreciation for the hard work team members accomplish every day throughout the National Lutheran family.

With an untiring mission to serve, the NLCS office collected \$580 worth of non-perishable items, amounting to 454 pounds of food, throughout the month of November. All items were donated to the Rockville-based Manna Food Center, the main food bank in Montgomery County, Md.

In addition to these acts of service, NLCS remains committed to offering opportunities to post-secondary students to learn about various aspects of senior services. During 2016, NLCS continued its partnership with the Calling and Purpose in Society (CAPS) Fellowship program of Valparaiso University. One CAPS Fellow offered more than 300 hours of work during his summer break, living and working at The Village at Rockville.







In order to extend our mission of caring for seniors, the National Lutheran Communities & Services' (NLCS) Board of Trustees established the Community Impact Grant Program. Annually, the board allocates funds from investments and investment earnings to provide grants to non-profit organizations in Maryland, Virginia, Delaware and Washington, D.C. through a competitive grant process. All grantees must demonstrate how they address at least one of the following areas of need among seniors:

Chronic disease management

Navigating and accessing health care and social services

Dealing with Alzheimer's disease, dementia and memory loss

Social isolation

Poverty and financial insecurity

The NLCS Board of Trustees appoints individuals to The Community Impact Advisory Council (CIAC), entrusting them with the responsibility to award grants to charitable organizations in the territory served by NLCS. During the fall months, the advisory council carefully reviews the more than 40 proposals submitted to NLCS for review and makes the difficult decision of which proposals to fund. All grantees are 501(c)(3) tax-exempt, charitable organizations. There are new and well-established programs, faith-based and secular organizations, urban and rural based services; all provide needed services to seniors. Each entity must provide extensive information about its finances, board, staff, and programs and complete periodic progress reports. In the spring of each year, every site is visited by a representative of NLCS. Funding for the grant program comes from charitable contributions and investment earnings; no resident funds are used for this purpose.

It is with the shared interest of serving seniors that NLCS celebrates with all 21 of the 2016 Community Impact Grantees in the moments of grace they brought to the seniors they serve.

Grace is the ability to meet the individual needs of each of our "neighbors," no matter their age or challenge in life, while preserving their dignity as a gift of God.





In 2016, residents, volunteers, and staff of The Village at Rockville—A National Lutheran Community, gave their time and resources to share VILLAGE God's grace with members of the surrounding community. For one of these grace-filled projects, residents assembled, cut, stuffed and sewed 148 soft fleece pillows by hand to deliver to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) Children's Inn—a hospitality house for families with ill children who are participating in research studies at NIH.

> The Busy Hands group also supported the NIH Children's Inn, knitting 40 Afghans. Moreover, they provided preemie blankets and hats for NICU patients; scarves and hats for Rockville Women's Shelter; and twiddle muffs, prayer squares and lap robes for neighboring residents—donating 2,080 hours in total.

Monthly support groups, led by staff, shared grace with nearby community members. Attendance ranged from 20-50 people at each meeting and covered a variety of topics including caregiver support and dementia. One such support group, called Café D, focused on caregivers supporting a loved one with dementia. Hosted by The Village at Rockville, through a partnership with the Alzheimer's Association and Montgomery College, 25 individuals were empowered with the knowledge from this group. As another show of support, staff and residents participated in the 2016 Alzheimer's walk, raising \$2,849 with 64 walkers.

The Village at Rockville also hosted a food drive in September, collecting 50 bags of non-perishable groceries for Millian United Methodist Church Food Pantry; in December, 75 coats were collected and donated to area homeless shelters, and four giant boxes of toys were donated to Toys for Tots.

Finally, The Village at Rockville joyfully hosted two physical therapy students, one from Montgomery College and one from the University of Delaware (UD); two occupational therapy students from University of Maryland, College Park (UMD) and one from UD, and 64 nursing students from UMD.

There were many moments of grace celebrated at The Village at Rockville this year, and many more to come.





ORCHARD RIDGE

There is a certain blessing one gets when acts of giving are done under the auspices of grace. Such are the activities of the residents VILLAGE at The Village at Orchard Ridge—A National Lutheran Community that affect the campus and the community that surrounds them. Take for instance The Flying Fingers, a resident knitting group, who devoted countless hours to children in need. Together, this team of 18 residents knitted 240 hats and fleece scarves and presented them to the superintendents of Winchester and Frederick County, Va., Public Schools to ensure that no child was cold this winter.

> Another example of grace is exemplified in Knots of Love, a project that creates pet blankets for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) crafted by assisted living memory care, long-term care, and independent living residents. This heartfelt project engaged residents in meaningful activities that they love; the 75 blankets that were donated were greatly appreciated by the shelter staff and put to good use for the many dogs and cats currently awaiting adoption at the SPCA.

In 2016, residents from Orchard Ridge amassed 3,653 service hours by extending a helping hand to several community organizations, such as Indian Hollow Elementary, Winchester Medical Center, First Baptist Church and Grace Lutheran Church. In addition to these hands-on service hours, residents collected and donated 74 cases of Ensure, 22 boxes of various dried goods and 264 miscellaneous canned goods to the Highland Food Pantry.

The celebration of music was also alive on the Orchard Ridge campus. Through a generous gift, a resident donated a beautiful hand-built Létourneau pipe organ for the Chapel. As part of the breaking in period, monthly organ concerts were hosted throughout 2016. Collaborating with the Winchester Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, an impressive array of talented organists showcased the vast spectrum of the organ as an instrument. Concerts were open to the public and averaged 200 people in attendance.

While giving in any form comes from a personal place, nestled deep in one's heart, residents at The Village at Orchard Ridge shared their home as well as their time, talent, and treasures with the broader community. Gracious acts of giving with a grace-filled spirit.






AUGUSTA

Part of the definition for grace is "bestowal of blessings," and that happens through the actions of residents at The Legacy at North Augusta—A National LEGACY
Lutheran Community. Early in 2016 the residents supported the children at the new Lutheran Family Services Minnick School opening in Harrisonburg, Va. The school helps children with emotional and behavioral challenges find NORTH success in the classroom, their family and life. Residents collected six boxes of school supplies and donated them at the grand opening, making sure kids of all grades started their new school year with what they needed. The school's administrators were very thankful.

> Grace was also present as residents worked to collect 110 pairs of new or gently used shoes for the Well of Hope International (WOHI) Shoe Project. WOHI ships donated shoes to Kenya, where they are sold to raise money to support widowed women and their children. The money raised from these shoes will buy land, build houses, and enable widows to care for their families. Anyone who has ever lost a loved one knows all-too-well how hard it can be to move forward after their death; this project resonated with residents and emboldened them to do all they could to help and share grace with those less fortunate.

Another grace-filled event was the annual Alzheimer's Walk in Augusta County; 30 staff and family members took part in this event, raising \$2,677. In preparing for the event a spirit week was hosted with a crazy hair/hat day, a sports day, an island-wear day, and an entirely purple day to raise funds. Blessings filled The Legacy at North Augusta throughout 2016, bestowing numerous opportunities to share God's grace with those in need.
