Alzheimer's Disease, **Dementia and Memory Loss**

Memory loss limits our independence as we age and contributes to caregiver burnout.



Navigating and Accessing Health Care and Social Services Even if services

are available in a community, they can be hard to locate and understand. Limited access to these resources has negative impacts on our health.



Housing 25% of older adults throughout Maryland, Virginia, D.C. and Delaware spend 30% or more on their housing expenses, which leaves less expendable income for other needs such as healthy foods and healthcare costs.
